A message from your Intergroup Chair



hen you attend A.A. meetings, sooner or later, you'll hear "The newcomer is the most important person in the room." If that is true, then the most important function in A.A. is getting him or her to that meeting. That's where Intergroup comes in.

Here at Intergroup the phones are answered 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. When someone calls for help we make sure a recovering alcoholic is always there to answer the call. We are also responsible for keeping track of all the A.A. meetings in the upper two thirds of New Jersey. That's roughly 1800 meetings. We update the meeting finder daily on our website NNJAA.org, which stands for Northern New Jersey Alcoholic Anonymous. We also produce a printed book listing the locations of all these meetings.

The Intergroup Office is run by three office staff and a handful of volunteers. We have a Steering Committee or Board of Trustees that oversee the smaller daily operations of the office. I am chairman of that Board. All major decisions at Intergroup are made by the A.A. groups or the group's representatives otherwise

known as the Intergroup Delegates. The Chairperson and all the Trustees were once Intergroup Delegates.

On the first Monday of every month, we hold an Intergroup Delegate's Meeting where all our committees discuss their current business. We also have an open forum where any group member can express their concerns regarding their home group or A.A. as a whole. With so many group delegates in attendance, there is always a wealth of knowledge and experience available. Celebrating 66 Years! Our 13th Annual

In closing I would like to mention something else we offer, which is probably the most unique experience A.A. has to offer. On a Sunday morning, four times a year, we meet in a parking lot whether it's hot, raining, or freezing cold-- hundreds of alcoholics gather together to swap speaking commitments for their home groups.

From Your "ALTERNATE" **Delegate's Desk**

n opening this article, I would first like to thank Wayne R., your Area Delegate - not only for giving me the opportunity to write this article as part of Alternate's Month - but also for all the other opportunities he has afforded me over the past two years. It has been a fantastic journey thanks both to Wayne - and to you for your confidence in me as well.

There must be something with this time of year, as both years, it seems that I have been privileged to report on

some truly interesting, important, and heartwarming matters of AA business. The items I mention here will be part of the Alternate Delegate's Report I give at the September ACM (which will already have happened when you read this), along with much more. So please be sure to ask your DCM for the details.

The most exciting item Wayne shared was a report from GSO announcing that our Big Book has been designated by the Library of Congress as one of the 88 "Books That Shaped America," and is currently included in the library's new exhibition. While we have always known just how influential our guide for recovery is to us, sometimes it's just comforting to know that our voice of attraction is recognized

outside our rooms. We all know how our PI committee is aware of this as they work so hard to keep copies in our libraries! (See actual press release on page 3 in this newsletter.)

The item that Wayne shared with me that struck me the most emotionally was a copy of a letter and a report from a representative from India who was granted permission to attend this year's GSO conference as an observer. The report covers so much. It looks at the history of AA in India, the rapid growth they are going through, the challenging demographics, the denial by functional alcoholics as a result of a lack of knowledge and the stigma of alcoholism, and so much more. The part that hit me personally was the challenge of reaching the women

alcoholics who carry an even larger stigma. They noted that they will be receiving a delegation of Women Alcoholics from Australia next year to work on this. I cannot express what that meant to me. Many of the first

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A Message from your Area Treasurer

"Into Action"

ello everyone! I had trouble getting started on this article and decided to go back and read what I wrote for the Fall 2011 edition. Wow, so much has happened over the past year, and the cool part is that most of it has been good!

In June of 2011, the Area was in the middle of a cash crunch and we had to transfer funds from the money market account into the checking account to cover expenses. From there, things got busy. The Finance Committee held a pilot 7th Tradition Workshop in October. In November, after hearing the groups' concerns at the October Assembly and reviewing the revenues, the path to cut non-12th step expenses and revise the budget process was clear. Looking back now and seeing all the work that has been done is truly amazing!

The Area will see the first draft of the new budgeting process in a few weeks. I hope all GSRs pay attention to the draft when it's reviewed at your district meetings and get it to your groups' next business meeting. It is really important that your groups' feedback comes back to the Finance committee in November (or December at the latest). We need that time to take the comments and concerns into account before submitting the final draft at the January assembly.

As for the 7th Tradition contributions – they have improved over 2011. This is a good start since 2011 was down so much from 2010. Groups, districts and individuals have increased their contributions, and in combination with cutting expenses, the cash flow issue from a year ago has rescinded. This does not mean we are out of the woods. It means that the pieces are in place and we all need to continue to focus on our primary purpose – carrying our message of hope through our outstanding committees!

I have offered to come speak at your district meetings and home groups and have been taken up on the offer several times. Reactions from the fellowship to the discussion of the 7th Tradition and the fact that twelfth step work has never been free (see AA Comes of Age page 140 – 141) has been eye open-

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ing. Some people have walked out while others have shouted "why are we wasting time talking about money when people need help staying sober?" Others have asked really excellent questions on how they can have this talk at their next business meeting. The bottom line is that money is necessary to pay our groups' rent, buy coffee and cookies, publish and ship our literature,

have up-to-date meeting lists, and have an AA member to answer the phone when someone reaches out for help.

It is my honor and privilege to support Alcoholics Anonymous – the fellowship and program that have saved my life!

AA's Big Book, Alcoholics Anonymous, Named by Library of Congress as one of the "Books That **Shaped America**"

(NEW YORK) - It's never been on The New York Times Best Seller list. Yet the "Big Book," A.A. members' fond name for the book Alcoholics Anonymous, is now designated by the Library of Congress as one of the 88 "Books That Shaped America," and is included in the library's new exhibition.

While we cannot know what impact AA's basic textbook, Alcoholics Anonymous, has had in shaping America, we do know that the Big Book has helped millions of men and women throughout the world, and in all walks of life, find a new and satisfying way of life without alcohol. The Big Book describes the A.A. program of action for recovery from alcoholism. It has offered convincing evidence to relatives and friends that alcoholics can recover; and has furnished revealing insights to physicians, psychologists, members of the clergy and other professionals who work with alcoholics.

Although no author is listed, it is common knowledge that the initial draft of the Big Book was written by AA co-founder Bill W. when he was not quite four years sober. But he did not complete it alone. Alcoholics Anonymous was a collective creation, since each chapter was "edited" by AA members in Akron, Ohio and New York City—all of them sober less time than Bill. This cooperative effort, reflecting the shared experience and consensus of the small Fellowship as a whole, set in motion the democratic process of decision-making that characterizes AA today.

The book provided the name for a small movement with nearly 100 members. It took 36 years to sell the first million copies. Yet today, every year approximately one million copies of the Big Book are distributed in the English language alone (it is translated into 67 languages), and A.A. membership has grown to over two million with a presence in more than 170 countries. In 2010, the thirty-millionth copy was presented to the American Medical Association, which declared alcoholism an illness in 1956.

Remote Communities/ Special Needs Committee News

hat if "Life on Life's Terms" meant you were confined to a nursing home? Ever wondered how you would feel if you couldn't get to meetings? If you suddenly, or not so suddenly, found yourself physically incapable of getting to the one place each week where you feel a sense of belonging?

Jimmy T. had a year and a half sober before ending up as a long-term resident. At first, "it was very lonely". Jimmy tried to make contact with other recovering people, but it was difficult. He went almost 6 years without a meeting. Finally the remote communities committee heard about his plight. Turns out there were others in the facility who also needed a meeting, and a very supportive administrator. Now Thursdays are the bright spot of Jimmy's week, as several local groups have adopted the center and regularly bring a discussion meeting inside.

It's not so hard to be of service to AAs in nursing homes. If you know of recovering AAs in a local nursing home, talk to your group about whether they want to take on a rewarding commitment. You can also reach out to the administration to see if there is a need. Depending on the facility, this type of discussion may happen with the administrator, the director of community affairs, or an onsite social worker. Many AAs get transferred out of their home area and don't have local contacts, but the administration will know who they are and whether they desire contact.

There are several ways to support AAs in nursing homes.

- Provide regular visits: contact with other recovering people can make a huge difference in our lives!
- Provide literature, especially large print. Many of our texts are available in large type and the pamphlet AA for the Older Alcoholic is available in Large Print too. (Reach out to remote communities for help with this).
- Sponsor a subscription to the Grapevine. You can send a gift subscription to a specific recovering individual or to the Nursing Home's library.
- · Bring a regular meeting inside. You'll need at least a few committed people who are willing to do regular service, and an agreement with the facility for space.

Over the last two years, I've been lucky enough to attend a wonderful AA meeting held at a nursing home in my district. Thursday evening is a special time to reflect on the blessings of sobriety and living life one day at a time. Our discussion meeting usually has 6-12 recovering AAs from the nursing home and the local AA community. Several long-term residents attend regularly.

Charlie K. sometimes has difficulty communicating, but has over 30 years in the program. Sometimes he shares vigorously and lucidly, and sometimes not, but one sentence he can reliably and predictably utter each week is "My name is Charlie and I'm a grateful recovering alcoholic." Nine months sober, Kate C. was crestfallen when she learned she wouldn't be released to home from the acute care hospital she was in, but would instead be transferred to a long-term residential nursing home. Her mood changed to one of exhilaration though, when she learned that she'd be able to attend meetings right in the dining room every week. "I was thrilled!" she says. Kate now attends regularly on Thursdays and goes out to other meetings with her sponsor who she met one Thursday. "I can't imagine my life without AA" she says.

Occasionally a short term resident or AA members who are visiting family will drop in. Once, we got to share a 90-day celebration with a young man who was recovering from the catastrophic physical effects of his last blackout. At the nursing home he was re-learning to walk, tie his own shoes and on Thursday nights, to live life a day at a time.

Some of us arrive in cars, some of **CELEBRATING XXIII YEARS** us in wheelchairs, some of us with walkers, but during our meeting there is no distinction between residents and non-residents. For at least an hour, we are all just recovering alcoholics, sharing our experience, strength and hope, and helping each other stay sober, one day at a time.

Again, there will be much more reported on these items and others at the ACM. There are new publications and EBooks by AAWS and Grapevine, there will be notes from a board meeting held in late July and a new Box 459 to review.

In closing, thank you so much again for allowing me to serve you the past two years. I am taught every day just how much I love this program and how much I owe it.

reetings from your newsletter editor. It has been a while since I have communicated to the fellowship in this space. It is usually reserved for announcements of themes for upcoming issues of This Day. The committee has decided to suspend the theme surveys that we have been announcing for the past several years. There are several reasons for this decision. One: fellowship participation was dwindling; Two: there has been an increase in the fellowship's "unsolicited" articles which we run in the "Speak Out" section of our newsletter. This is a good trend, keep it up. We encourage all members of the fellowship to tell us what is on their mind. Finally Three: in the light of the area's request to save money we

looked at our budget and noticed that the only way to save money would be to print less pages of each of the four issues each year. Before we came up with the idea of announcing a theme for each issue we were producing three 8-page issues and one 12-page (Mini-Conference) issue each year. Lately we have been automatically turning out 12-page issues. It is more expensive to print a 12-page issue than it is to print an 8-pager.

Area 44 heard the concerns of the GSRs expressed at our January Assembly about reducing our spending and has asked all committees to seriously consider ways to save money on their 2012 and 2013 budgets. The only expenses incurred by the newsletter committee are the costs of paper, ink, and mailing. The only option that we have to save money would be to reduce the number of pages in each issue of *This Day*.

The bad side of this decision is

that we need to be sure that we include all of the news that our fellowship would like to read. I have decided to hold three articles until next issue rather than expand this issue from 8 to 12. pages. That is the problem, in printing, it has to be 4, 8, or 12 pages. Many times, after all the articles are in, I wind up with 10 pages. I either cut 2 pages to make it 8 or I have to fill or add 2 more pages to make the issue a 12-pager. To fill another 2 pages would require my writing 3,200 more words. Not an easy task

I apologize to those AAs who sent in articles which didn't make this issue but be assured they will run in the next issue. And please don't let this discourage anyone from submitting to *This Day*. The fellowship needs to hear your thoughts on AA in Northern New Jersey.

COURAGE IN AA

ourage was one thing I never had much of growing up. Once I started to drink for the courage to do certain things, the long term result was always less courage. After twenty years of alcoholic drinking, my fears only increased. Ten subsequent years without drinking, drugging, or AA, and no Twelve Steps in my life, did very little to change things.

Upon entering AA, little by little some fears were faced, and conquered. The more the 12 steps were a part of my life, the less I had fear. Today I know that fear is a lack of faith. If I keep increasing my relationship with my Higher Power, my fear will keep decreasing.

Throughout our years in AA all of us have had to display much courage. A lot of it is required to take the actions necessary to recover from alcohol. Walking into AA for the first time, asking for a sponsor to help us, taking commitments, and most importantly doing the steps, all require strong willingness and courage. The most important action steps, four through nine, require the greatest use of these two spiritual qualities. A lot of us end up doing these things because we are ready to go to any lengths to get sober, most of us because of pain.

For me to be a strong member of AA, and to show my gratitude for this program, I must show it with my actions. I have to do my very best to protect AA's principles. Doing this has always brought me fear, and has required some real courage. You would not think this would be the case, but it sadly is. The most common reason being, not many members in the fellowship feel the same way I do.

Protecting and standing up for these principles, in and out of the rooms, takes real courage. Who would have ever thought that we would have to stick up for Big Book enthusiasts being called "thumpers," and worst of all "Nazis." Individuals apologizing for quoting the Big Book at discussion meetings. Having to be uncomfortable telling someone to stop talking, texting, or making noise at a meeting. Being the only one who seems to be concerned with keeping to a particular group's conscience. Or being at a strange meeting where anonymity is being violated, and being the only one in the room willing to say something. Now, here is a really tough one, being at a closed meeting of AA where member's keep bringing their children, and having to say something to protect the anonymity of alcoholics in and

outside of that room. Lastly, the courage to suggest to a member, one with a few twenty fours, to stop 13 stepping newcomers. I am embarrassed to say I have balked at that one so far, I haven't mustered up enough courage. Should we just stand by, ignore it, and watch newcomers being robbed of their chance to recover? Behavior like this kills people, it is that plain and simple.

It can get lonely sometimes trying to protect the program that has saved your life. You can even start to feel like there's something wrong with you. Why are there not more people doing this? In most cases the lack of knowledge, or the lack of courage to actually do something, are the two main reasons. If an individual sees something wrong going on, and then does nothing, aren't they just adding to that wrong? I have been at meetings, sadly more than a couple of times, where DCM's are in attendance, and they stay silent when Traditions are being broken at their own Home Group. They know and see it is happening, but fear stops them from saying anything.

There was a situation that happened at an area function recently. The function was attended by past Delegates, DCM's, Committee members, etc. One of the activities on the agenda, was a casual, festive gathering of AA officers. Some attendees, including a past delegate, took out their cameras to take pictures and video. This room had the shades with the AA Steps and Traditions on the wall. Not to mention a room full of AA members. When this was brought to the attention of someone there, it was quickly dismissed. To speak up took courage, to be ignored

can really be painful. It is a sort of spiritual pain, pain that you must experienced to really identify with. Can ignorance be the culprit here, even at this level of AA? I certainly hope not, but it might very well have contributed to it. Those who recognized the infraction, and didn't do anything, I guess they weren't bothered enough. They just weren't in enough pain to say or do anything. Maybe they just didn't have the courage to do so. Possibly, they just wanted to be accepted by their peer group. Wow, that sounds familiar, I use to drink for that very same reason. This situation was quickly addressed and then rectified at the area level.

Nowadays, I am trying my best to pick the most important battles, and let the smaller ones go. Hard to do at times. Some times those little battles. start small, but become big problems all by themselves. A close friend in AA would say to me on occasion. "Why don't you just sit back and watch the parade go by?" Well if everyone were to say nothing, the result would eventually be no parade! I hope in the future to have less and less fear when it comes to protecting AA's principles. The more faith I have at those moments, the less fear I'll feel. I tell myself to try hard to "Say what you mean, but don't say it mean." Very difficult principles to live by, but I must if I am to live with myself. I guess I'll just keep coming, and pray for the courage to face fear. I can only hope that with God's grace, I will have the courage to do so.


