

# Celebrating 80 Years of Recovery, Unity, and Service: The Foundation for Our Future

It's hard to believe that my first General Service Conference has already come and gone. I have to say that it was beyond my expectations. The mission, the work, the spirit, the service and especially the people were all extraordinary. I feel humbled to report that the 65th General Service Conference achieved a true spirit of unity expressed through actions intended to deliver accessibility and inclusivity.

Crowne Plaza, Times Square: Saturday afternoon. I had arrived. I was a bundle of emotions. Not fearful exactly, and naturally I was excited, but I felt a bit tentative and a little nervous. Of course I found out later that I wasn't alone. Soon the Delegates' Only meetings began, and a good bit of that apprehension wore off as the people I met were so warm, generous and engaging; especially the 2nd year Delegates.

On Sunday the Conference formally opened and I started to warm up. Roll Call signified

the official start of the Conference. My name was called and I was visibly moved (translated that means openly crying). As each additional name was called this feeling intensified. J. Gary L., our Northeast Regional Trustee, delivered the Keynote Address, and it was one of the most insightful and touching talks about A.A. that I've heard (I'm going to include the address as part of our Post-Conference meetings. So to learn more about how we meet the challenges facing A.A. today and other great things that happened at our General Service Conference, I urge you to attend one of our upcoming Delegates' Post-Conference reports).

By Tuesday morning all Conference Committees were meeting for the second time and it was there, looking around the room at my fellow Literature Committee members, that I believed I was really becoming part of this thing.

On Wednesday the committee reports and recommendations came to the Conference floor. I went to the microphone for the first time to share on an issue I'm especially passionate about, and I felt like a full participant. For the next 2-1/2 days we discussed, debated and voted on so many important issues.

When the Conference came to a close on Friday evening, and again during Saturday morning's rotating Trustee farewell talks, I knew I had just been part of something very special, and perhaps had the most important spiritual experience of my life.

My transformation from apprehension to belonging happened so swiftly that I almost didn't notice. Not dissimilar to my experience of coming to A.A., meeting a sponsor, taking the steps, and having a spiritual awakening...although that spiritual experience took more than a week!

After our Area elections last October I thanked you for this opportunity, but I didn't even know what I was thanking you for. Now I know. With all my heart I want to express my gratitude for the opportunity you've given me to serve you as your Delegate. I want you to know that with you at the helm guiding me and the other members of the General Service Conference, we can rest assured that A.A. is in good hands.

#### Lessons from the Traditions

A few weeks ago a friend of mine texted me. He was speaking at a meeting and no one was available to go with him. He asked if I could come for support. It turned out that I was available and could attend to support him and the other speaker. My friend and the other speaker, who just happened to be in the area for a picnic, both spoke about how our common welfare was so important to their sobriety as well as how that principle saved their lives on several occasions and helped one of their groups through a crisis.

I hadn't thought about Tradition 1 in a while. I was reminded that this selfish alcoholic has to also focus on my group to ensure that we are carrying the message. In my group, we do this by making sure that newcomers who arrive at our meeting on a Friday night are welcome, given a meeting book with phone numbers and know who is available to serve as a temporary sponsor. Our Group also sends speakers to other meetings to carry our message of recovery to them and has incoming speakers so that we can hear their message.

We also make sure that our Home group has a GSR that attends the District meeting and Assemblies and is the voice of our Group at these meetings. We provide feedback on recent items like how our Group felt about fully funding the

Delegate to attend the General Service Conference. I wish there was a greater level of interest about these matters but there are many AA members who do not care about AA beyond their groups. They do not understand how these issues affect our common welfare and AA as a whole.

I then turned my thoughts to the other Traditions. We have 12 Steps for Recovery, 12 Traditions for Unity and 12 Concepts for Service. These legacies are guides for us. As I've progressed in my sobriety, I have come to realize that the phrase "practice these principles in all my affairs" for Step 12 covers all 36 of these principles.

In the early 40's as AA grew, our Fellowship experienced a number of growing pains. Earl T., an early, influential AA in Chicago, suggested to Bill W. that he codify the principles by which our Groups could follow a spiritual path. Our 12 Traditions were originally referred to as "Twelve Points to Assure Our Future". In fact, many organizations like the Washingtonians have disappeared because the way that members relate to one another was never identified and they strayed from their primary purpose. This will hopefully never happen in AA as we have Tradition 5 which reminds us that our primary purpose is to help the still suffering Alcoholic inside and outside the rooms.

Perhaps the most important Tradition for me is Tradition 2. I constantly need to be reminded that it is not important what I think because I would always want things done my way; a more spiritual path must be taken. Any business item in my Group is thoroughly discussed and a

group conscience is arrived at. This must happen at levels in our Fellowship: in my Home Group, at my District meetings, at the Area Committee level and at the level of the General Service Conference. To be truly spiritual, we must be able to listen to all viewpoints including those of the people who truly annoy us and then be able to accept the Group Conscience even when we vehemently disagree with what has been decided.

It's the other half of Tradition 2 that is equally important for me. I still remember my attitude and the hubris that I had when I was rotating in several years back as DCM. I was going to be the best DCM that my District had ever seen because I knew how to run a District the right way. It has taken a lot of hard work and numerous lessons in humility to realize that I need to keep my ego in check and that as a leader I am a trusted servant, I do not govern.

At this year's NERAASA Treasurers roundtable, as each attendee gave an overview of what is going on in her/his Area or District, the breadth and depth of what Area 44 and its many active committees continues to do was quite apparent. From the Literature inventory we can afford to have on hand and make available for sale to members at numerous meetings, to the amount of Literature and Grapevine materials we transfer to Corrections using JailBox contributions, to CPC outreach to a variety of professional constituencies, to Public Information's Adopt a Rack Program, to Remote Communities efforts to reach those not able to come to meetings, to just mention a few.... and there are many more examples I could cite, it is clear that our Area is most fortunate to have the resources and the willingness to help the sick and suffering alcoholic who is recovering and those seeking our help.

Much of March was spent attending all eight Pre-Conference sessions and briefly sharing about the 7th Tradition, discussing the 12-Step work the Area continues to perform, and providing information about overall Area contribution history. This was a fabulous experience. The turnout was outstanding as was the interest in our 7th Tradition. Somewhere close to 300 Treasurer's packets containing material about where Money and Spirituality mix were distributed along with handouts presenting how groups in Northern NJ donate to GSO, NNJ Intergroup and NNJGS-Area 44. By the end of every session, almost every packet was gone and handout taken.

As summer approaches, the Finance committee will begin its work collaborating with Special Committee Chairs, Standing Committee Chairs and Officers to develop a balanced budget for 2016 so the Area can continue its 12-Step work. Each member of the Finance committee will be assigned as a "Budget Buddy" to assist and support the efforts of specific committee chairpersons and officers as they plan and budget for next year. More information will be coming soon from Finance committee chair Jim H. Thank you for the time and thought that will be focused on this effort.

While our Area is very active, there are still numerous opportunities to volunteer and serve on one of the Area's Standing or Special Committees to "Carry the Message." Member participation is most welcome and encouraged. Bringing an AA Meeting to the Women in the County Jails

The only thing I can say about why I got involved with service in the jails is that it was on my mind, and I kept thinking about it. I have never been in jail, and I never personally knew anyone else who had been in jail prior to when I began this service.

Bringing an AA meeting to one of the county jails is indeed a very special experience. The women that attend an AA meeting in jail are truly a cross section of society, just like a regular AA meeting. Young, middle-aged and older, garden-variety alcoholics, dual-addicted, married, unmarried, some are parents and some were living with their parents prior to their time in jail.

The sadness, anger and sense of victimization is palpable in the room. Denial is also quite palpable at most of the jail meetings I've attended.

I try my best to keep my focus on 3 things:


- 1. conveying what my last days of drinking were like in terms of failing health, depression and hopelessness
- 2. sharing how drastically my life has changed so that my sense of hope and gratitude becomes a palpable energy in the room
- 3. express how deeply I believe one must ask God for help, and how considering the spiritual solution can be the most amazing turning point in life

Quite often the anger of the prisoner is directed at themselves "for being stupid, etc." This is the golden moment to remind the ladies about the disease nature of alcoholism - that it is not a moral issue. Hitting this cord frequently results in the tears starting to flow. I think that is a good sign. And then the other magic moment arrives . . . a little bit of laughter, and then more laughter. I believe that is where much of the healing and love of AA emerges - in the laughter. Its great to hear laughter in jail, specifically AA laughter that is ripe with understanding and compassion.

Frequently I'll mention how alcoholism will bring us to the "last house on the block". The "last house on the block" has 3 doors: 1 for mental institutions, 1 for jail and 1 for the cemetery. I'm surprised how many women in jail have never heard that expression despite the fact they say they went to meetings before their jail days. Perhaps they just don't remember. Going into a jail and simply saying out loud "You are worth recovering from alcoholism, you are worthy of all the love, understanding and peace of mind that is truly available", saying that out loud is liberating for me. It is liberating because it is true. Its wonderful to speak encouragement, love and hope to our fellow humans.

At the very beginning of my sobriety, AA was a safe place for me to have my feelings and share my confusion and pain. I also listened to people share hope, laughter, love and compassion. It is a privilege to do the same for others. It is invigorating and fills my spirit with gratitude and joy to be the person who can spread the message of recovery.

As an Intergroup delegate and member of the Nightwatch committee, I'm always amazed and inspired by the level of commitment and enthusiasm demonstrated by everyone doing Nightwatch. The Intergroup office staff and our area coordinators do an amazing job working together and with their local AA groups to cover and support the weekly Nightwatch schedule. Their experience and commitment bring it all together each and every Friday night. But Nightwatch could not continue without the faithful support of every group and AA member who steps up to answer the call and share their time and experience as a phone volunteer or 12th step contact. It's a power much greater than the sum of all our individual efforts that makes Nightwatch the labor of love and service it has become over the past 24 years.

The Nightwatch program began on St. Patrick's Day weekend in 1991 and since then has provided groups and members with a valuable opportunity to serve and carry the message of recovery. On duty when the Intergroup office is closed for the night and on weekends, Nightwatch volunteers answer calls forwarded to their phone at home. For the most part, we provide callers with information about the time and location of AA meetings or phone numbers for other New Jersey Intergroup offices or related help, such as Al-Anon/Alateen or NA. But Nightwatch is at its best when we're able to provide a local 12th Step contact to someone calling for help with his or her drinking problem. Being able to share AA's message of hope when most needed, and connect a fellow alcoholic with their local AA community for help and support is Nightwatch's primary purpose.

There are two ways that a group can participate in Nightwatch. The first and most familiar is by taking a week-long commitment where group members take turns answering the phone during the 11 available shifts. A group leader is designated and takes responsibility for scheduling the volunteers and distributing the Nightwatch manuals. The manuals have step by step guidelines for answering most types of calls and include the 12th step contact listings. Many AA groups have made Nightwatch an annual group service commitment, and our members have gained valuable Nightwatch experience over the years. We encourage group members to share their questions and concerns with their area coordinator, group leader and each other, and work closely with first-time volunteers to pass on best practices and helpful encouragement. Our shared Nightwatch experience is ever growing and serves as a powerful guide as

we become more and more effective in our 12<sup>th</sup> step work.

The second but just as important way groups participate in Nightwatch is by providing a list of members willing to serve as local 12th step contacts. These lists are included in the Nightwatch manual by county and town and are used by the phone volunteers to find a local 12th step contact who will return a call to someone reaching out for help. The contact lists are updated annually from completed forms returned by the groups to the Intergroup office. The form used for our 12th step contact lists was mailed to all groups in early spring and to date about 150 forms have been returned. The form can be downloaded from the Nightwatch page at www.nnjaa. org and submitted to the Intergroup office at any time.

Over the years, so many of us have taken on the commitment to serve as a 12th step contact and be there to extend the hand of AA. How often have we heard a speaker share how calling the AA number and having an understanding AA member call back was the beginning of their sober journey? It is so important for us and our groups to stay mindful of the importance of being available as local 12th step contacts. Our phone volunteers often report they have a difficult time finding a local contact available to return a 12th step call. I understand there are probably as many reasons as there are AA's for why this is, and truthfully I have been the reluctant and unavailable contact more times than I care to admit. But by God's grace and the support of my AA co-workers, I'm learning through experience that the commitments I make greatly shape and define the path of my sober life. It has become important for me to understand and accept the responsibility I've signed up for as a Nightwatch contact, and answer my phone after 6 pm, even when I don't recognize the caller ID number. It just might be the Nightwatch phone volunteer calling to ask me to return a call to someone nearby who just so happened to become my most recent sponsee. It's amazing how that

I see Nightwatch more and more as a valuable group service opportunity that is most dynamic and effective when practiced by AA groups from both ends of the line: as an annual week-long commitment to answer the call and as a committed group of 12th step contacts willing and available to return the call when an alcoholic in need reaches out for help. Thank you again for your enthusiasm and support of Nightwatch. You continue to encourage and inspire me in recovery, unity and service, and for that I pray I will remain forever grateful. #### TO KEEP IT YOU NEED TO GIVE IT AWAY

My AA experience has been nothing but a miracle. If it hadn't been for my higher power, I call God, I would have never found the rooms of AA. It was a divine intervention, "I was plucked from hell and put into heaven."

God did for me what I could not do for myself. For that, I will be forever grateful. In an instant, my life changed forever. One moment I was a drunk, broken and desperate in my own hell. The next, I was being saved by the fellowship of AA with love. AA taught me how to heal and have hope. I walked into the AA meeting absolutely terrified but 3 1/2 years later, I am living a life I had always dreamed of. The key word being LIVING. The gift of sobriety taught me how to run to life instead of from it, pushing through fear, pain and shame to get to the other side. I made it to that side and the sunlight of the spirit shines on me each and every day. This doesn't mean, I don't have to deal with life on God's terms, but the fellowship taught me how to deal with the terms.

I had 3 things pushing me into sobriety when I came in; the gift of desperation, my mother was in Stage 4 cancer with me being her caregiver and God. Failure was not an option. I had to succeed to suit up and show up for myself, my mother and God.

So I took the deep dive. I surrendered, turned it over and Let Go and Let God

I listened for the first time in my life. I followed my marching orders, suggestions as my sponsor called them. Service work was a part of them. I learned, "To keep it, you need to give it away." I definitely wanted to stay in heaven and never go back to that hell again. So I started my service work. First, as a greeter, then the dreaded speaking engagements

that taught me how to get over the fear of public speaking, then leading my home group meeting, I wanted to say no. But was told you never say no. Plus I always felt God was asking me. I didn't want to disappoint him after he was kind enough to forgive, save and bless me. Though my mother's condition worsened, I accepted the 3 month commitment. In looking back, I truly believe leading that meeting was God's way of keeping me sane and sober through the hardest time of my life, watching my mother die. But the true gift was me being "present"" She was able to let go knowing I was sober. She loved AA and was so impressed with the organization. As she said, who would have thought alcohol, which she despised, ending up bringing me to the life she had always wanted for me.

After she passed, I took a leap of faith and moved to the Jersey Shore. The loss of my mother was life changing for me. Now that I was sober, I wasn't going to waste anymore of my precious life. Every day mattered. I had a dream.

With that came my next service commitment. As I was sitting in the Spring Lake 10 am Saturday meeting, I heard, we need someone for the GSR position, There was my God moment again. He was saying this will help you with your grief. Get out of yourself and go help someone. What a great experience it has been for me. I have attended all sorts of conferences, workshops, took a bus trip sponsored by the district to the General Service Office in NY. Most recently, I have now become a CPC chair. I look forward to this role of educating the professionals about AA.

When it comes to service work for me, I must always remember I am here to help the sick and suffering alcoholic. I cannot forget what has been given to me. I also must always remember to not allow the gifts of sobriety keep me away from AA. I need to make the time. For without my sobriety, I wouldn't have any of these gifts. So, I serve when I can.

I have heard, Don't leave before the miracle happens. The miracles have been countless. I am joyous, happy and free and living the dream. Thank you AA and God!

Well we have been talking it about it for a long time, but its here now and ready to go. The group change/ new group fillable form is done and should be up on the website as you read this article. The form will allow groups to update their group information, such as a new GSR, meeting address change, group name change, group mailing contact changes. The form will also allow groups who are looking to register with GSO, or are new to obtain a group number. The fillable form will be on the Area website on the members password protected side. The form can be filled out and E mailed directly to the Area registrar and the groups DCM. This will allow quicker updating of group information, and help keep group informed. I would like to thank everyone who helped put this form together, it is going to be a big help in keeping our groups connected to the Area as well as GSO.

How a Group Becomes Active- The first time that group information is forwarded for listing with the GSO we list the group as "pending active" (the 1990 General Service Conference recommended the General Service Office delay processing new A.A. group information forms for 30 days to allow

the local A.A. structure to participate in the process). This process remains in place today whether the group information is received hard copy or entered by the area registrar via FNV.

The database automatically assigns a six digit group service number that is unique to the group and different from that of any other A.A. group listed with the GSO; however that 6 digit service number should not be relayed to the group until the 30 day pending period has expired.

That six digit service number is never reassigned, even if a group disbands. Once the 30 day pending period has passed the status of the group is upgraded from "Pending Active" to "Active". The group, area delegate, and registrar are advised of the group's service number and a New Group Kit is ordered and sent to the mail contact listed on the group's record within 7-10 business days after the 30 day pending period expires.

**How a Group Becomes Unknown**- When a group's status changes from Active to Unknown it does not mean that the group is inactive. It means the GSO does not have a mail contact attached to the group's record to receive the communications that are sent from the GSO.

A group can also become "Unknown" because of returned mail. The Records department makes every attempt to contact the person to attain a new mailing address, however if that new information cannot be attained the contact's information is removed from the record and the group's status is changed to "Unknown". If there is a secondary contact on the group's record the mail will default to that person and the group's status remains active.

Incomplete - Indicates a group record was added to the database without all of the information necessary to show up on the Records departments' daily "New Group" report. The status remains incomplete until the registrar receives the remaining required information from the group or when the Registrar queries the database for "Incomplete" groups and reaches out update and completes the record. Until then the "New Group" remains in limbo.

A group's record can also become "Incomplete" when and if the contact and/or meeting information in the record is removed and not replaced.



### **DIVERSITY**

The topic of my discussion was on diversity. Diversity understanding and recognizing that each individual case can be somewhat different. Why? These differences cover the dimensions of race, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, economic status, age, physical abilities, and religious beliefs. It is the exploration of these differences in a safe, positive, and nurturing environment. It is about understanding that each one of us suffer in a common way and our purpose is to embrace sobriety. We are not all alike but diversity is natural in our existence, which includes people.

Diversity in the program of Alcoholics Anonymous starts with the right of choice of a Higher Power, or God, which is used in our literature. Some would consider this approach religious like, other might say it sound like a cult. This approach seems to allow the alcoholic to focus on their problems of drinking first, then choosing what source of power that works for them best. It's about our drinking problem first and then the focus becomes our coping with life on life terms

It's not surprising to find diversity among our fellowship and program; simply because our literature tells us that we are people who would not normally mix in our drinking days. Not only have some of our personalities been affected, the program explains that some of us are sicker than others, unfortunately. For this reason, we need to work together to arrest this disease of alcoholism. There are times when someone is sharing their experience strength and hope they will refer to their culture background, for example, I hear often, a person may say "I'm CIA" Catholic Irish alcoholic, I am

a female African American, and we all drink alcoholically.

We soon learn that the suffering and disease is the same even though we were raised or bought up in different cultures. For this reason, many of us may perceive matters slightly different in some cases, but if we stay in the program, we then understand it's whatever it takes to stay sober. Diversity is encountered on every level of the program, from the group level into every other level of service. This is where the existence of the (36) principles, the Steps, Traditions, and the Concepts come in, a means of protection from ourselves. We vote on changes that can better support our program and the groups which allows for a God like conscious to prevail.

After being in the fellowship for a time, it did not take long to accept and respect other individual's differences. Individual's differences in race, culture, gender, physical abilities, religion, and those with different ideas, they all played a very large and important part in my recovery. The diverse fellowship of AA helps us stay sober one day at a time.

When I introduce myself, I introduce myself as an alcoholic. When I needed help and the hand of AA was there, I knew I couldn't pick and choose where my help was coming from. I could not afford to say "this person is not like me and therefore, can't help me". I came into Alcoholics Anonymous and it was suggested "get a Higher Power of your understanding" and that is still working for me today. Interacting with sober people who are different helps me grow in knowledge, understanding new things, acceptance, regardless of their diff-

erences.

That's a part of the unity of the fellowship. Sometimes this diversity is overshadowed by a person's own bigotry and intolerance. There are of course, those meetings that are exclusive to certain people. Just like each individual and our society as a whole, Alcoholics Anonymous has biases. Only by the Grace of God, we are able to acknowledge and work past them. Thankfully, there are so many meetings today, if you feel uncomfortable in a meeting, you can find another one, unlike in the past days of A.A. In conclusion: In our Big Book There is a Solution on page 17: "all sections of this country and many of its occupations are represented, as well as many political, economic, social, and religious backgrounds. We are people who normally would not mix. But there exists among us a fellowship, a friendliness, and an understanding which is incredibly wonderful". "The tremendous fact for every one of us is that we have discovered a common solution. We have a way out on which we can absolutely agree, and upon which we can join in brotherly and harmonious action. This is the great news this book carries to those who suffer from alcoholism."

In the rooms we strive to protect and appreciate diversity in all of its forms. Let's not forget to also respect and value the differences in our fellowship. Without it our vision would be very narrow and we would be limited by only having our own mistakes and breakthroughs, or those by others like us, to learn from.
