"Are these extravagant promises? We think not. We see them happening all around us, sometimes quickly, sometimes slowly. They will always materialize if we work for them." Alcoholics Anonymous, p. 84.

In my early days of recovery, AA seemed like a mystical cult. The people I saw at meetings were ordinary enough. It was what they said that was other-worldly.

For example, they kept saying, "Fake it till you make it." That was really strange. It was like being hypnotized on stage before

an audience, where you knew exactly what you were doing, but just went along with the hypnotist's instructions for the good of the show.

So I did what they told me to do at meetings – arrived early, stayed late, set up and took down tables and chairs, made coffee, reached out my hand to others – even though I had little faith that anything good would come of these actions.

Actually, I did begin to feel a little better after following these simple instructions for a while. At least I wasn't drinking, and it didn't seem to bother me as much as I feared it would.

"Just bring the body, and the mind will follow."

There was another spooky AA slogan. How could that be? I felt like one of the "pod people" in that old movie, The Night of the Living Dead. Was this a subtle form of brainwashing?

At early meetings I began to see myself as one of the characters in The Manchurian Candidate who had wandered into a meeting of the women's garden club, knowing I didn't belong there, but enduring the proceedings, while in reality a much more serious scene was taking place.

Before I knew it, I started enjoying the discussions and felt like I actually belonged there. Maybe there was something to these slogans after all.

However, there was one slogan I thought I could never buy:

"Don't give up before the miracle occurs."

Get real! Was I supposed to hang around this program until some sort of burning bush appeared? I'd seen all the Cecil B. De Mille movies, and nothing like that was ever going to happen to me.

Then something changed my mind on that score. I saw other newcomers walk through the doors of AA who were totally a mess. "He'll never make it!" I would say to myself about a particular AA novice. A few months later I would see the same person

again who was hardly recognizable from the guy I saw at his first meeting.

I remember one man in particular who looked like the typical Bowery bum at his first few meetings. He couldn't put two words together, but I did understand him to say he hadn't slept in a bed for three years.

Three years later he spoke at an anniversary meeting. He looked and spoke like a distinguished college professor. There was no burning bush, but it was the closest thing to a miracle I ever saw.

Now I take the various slogans to heart. If they're working for others, they must be working for me. I'm going to keep coming until they all materialize.

The Third Founding Moment

Last quarter we talked about the Second Founding Moment in the History of Alcoholics Anonymous. We've talked about "Synchronicity", The Providential Hand that is back of the founding of the AA movement as well as the basis for "Carry this Message"! Let's see how we can continue to use AA History and the Four Founding Moments to Carry AA's Message. The third founding moment was Bill's "White Light" experience in the Town's Hospital.

Ebby carries the Oxford Group tenants of sharing, surrender, restitution and guidance to Bill and shows that sobriety is possible through spirituality.

"My ideas about miracles were drastically revised right then. Never mind the musty past; here sat a miracle directly across the kitchen table. He shouted great tidings."

"Thus was I convinced that God is concerned with us humans when we want Him enough. At long last I saw, I felt, I believed. Scales of pride and prejudice fell from my eyes. A new world came into view." (Bill has gained a willingness to listen and lay aside spiritual prejudice He was "convinced.") Bill has "come to believe

"Upon a foundation of complete willingness (to believe in the Power of God as I understand God) I might build what I saw in my friend."

But Bill still didn't like the idea of a "Personal God". Ebby had come carrying the message of Jesus in the context of First Century Christianity as practiced by the Oxford Group but Bill's mind snapped shut to such ideas. But gradually Bill began to realize the fatality and futility of his situation. He began to compare his alcoholism to a fatal cancer. He realized that if someone handed him a cure for that fatal malady he would follow it and accept it unconditionally, yet here he was rejecting the solution that Ebby was bringing because it offended his "sensibilities". Thank God Bill was desperate! He wanted to know more, so he sought out Ebby at the Calvary Rescue Mission the following Sunday. Bill took the subway to Manhattan and in true alcoholic fashion he got

off the train at the wrong stop. He walked across 23rd street stopping at many of the Gin Mills. Along the way he made friends with a Finnish fisherman named Alec Johnson. After a few drinks together Bill took Alec in hand and told him we are off to meet "The Fishers of Men."

When they arrived at the Calvary Mission Bill was so drunk and loud they almost didn't let him in to the Mission but Ebby showed up and settled Bill down with some coffee and a plate a beans. Bill sat and listened to the testimony of many reformed drunks. When it came time for the altar call Bill shuffled up with the group of repentant sinners and made his surrender at the rail. Later, Bill couldn't remember what he had done or said but Ebby told he had given his life over to God. Several days later Bill checked into the Towns Hospital for his fourth and final detox. After repeating the familiar Belladonna and Hydrotherapy treatment (Puke and Purge) Ebby came to visit Bill. Bill feared the expected evangelism but Ebby did no preaching. Instead he waited for Bill to ask "Ebby, what was that neat little formula you told me about?" Ebby repeated the message of the life-changing program of action; the actions he had undertaken with the Oxford Group that led to his own recovery:

- He admitted that he was powerless to manage his own life.
- He became honest with himself as never before; made an "examination of conscience."
- He made a rigorous confession of his personal defects and thus quit living alone with his problems.
- He surveyed his distorted relations with other people, visiting them to make what amends he could
- He resolved to devote himself to helping others in need, without the usual demand for personal prestige or material gain.
- By meditation, he sought God's direction for his life and the help to practice these principles of conduct at all times.

...and then Ebby left. Bill sank

into the darkest depths of depression that he had ever encountered. He found himself crying out "If there be a God show Himself! I am ready to do ANYTHING! ANYTHING AT ALL!" Bill described what happened next in "AA Comes of Age."

"Suddenly the room lit up with a great white light. I was caught up into an ecstasy which there are no words to describe. It seemed to me, in the mind's eye, that I was on a mountain and that a wind not of air but of spirit was blowing. And then it burst upon me that I was a free man. Slowly, the ecstasy subsided. I lay on the bed, but now for a time I was in another world, a new world of consciousness. All about me and through me there was a wonderful feeling of Presence, and I thought to myself, so this is the God of the Preachers."

So the work is complete – in just the twinkling of eye, old things pass away and all things begin anew. For a while Bill enjoys the new peace and happiness but then the thinking mind begins to reassert itself and Bill fears for his sanity.

Bill calls for Dr. Silkworth...

"But soon my so-called reason returned, my modern education took over. I thought I must be crazy, and I became terribly frightened. Dr. Silkworth, a medical saint if ever there was one, came in to hear my trembling account of this phenomenon. After questioning me carefully, he assured me that I was not mad, that I had perhaps undergone a psychic experience which might solve my problem. Skeptical man of science though he then was, this was most kind and astute. If he had said, "hallucination," I might now be dead. To him I shall ever be eternally grateful."

Dr. Silkworth tells Bill whatever it is you've found you better hang onto it, you are so much better then you were just 2 hours ago. With these words Bill Came to Believe and would find further reinforcement from other great men who had "Come to Believe"

Bill remembered...

"More light on this came the next

day. It was Ebby, I think, who brought me a copy of William James' Varieties of Religious Experience. It was rather difficult reading for me, but I devoured it from cover to cover. Spiritual experiences, James thought, could have objective reality; almost like gifts from the blue, they could transform people. Some were sudden brilliant illuminations; others came on very gradually. Some flowed out of religious channels; others did not. But nearly all had the great common denominator of pain, suffering, and calamity. Complete hopelessness and defilation at depth were almost always required to make the recipient ready. The significance of all this burst upon me. Deflation at depth-yes that was it. Exactly that had happened to me. Dr. Carl Jung had told an Oxford Group friend of Ebby's how hopeless his alcoholism was and Dr. Silkworth had passed the same sentence on me."

Bill through his reading of William James and the Story of Rowland Hazard and Carl Jung came to truly know the problem and the solution. The Spiritual Malady. While lying in the bed in the Towns Hospital he would be graced with a "Vison for You" where he could see one alcoholic carrying the message to another in an ever widening circle.

Bill though VRE would come to understand the necessity for:

Deflation at Depth

That there was a "Variety" of Religious Experiences

That many were sudden but still more were gradual

That the only cure for dipsomania was Religiomania

That self-surrender was the vital turning point......

"That God could and would if he were sought!

We're there at the door with a welcoming handshake and a word of encouragement, passing along a meeting book with local meetings circled and explained, as a sober example of how and why our program of recovery, fellowship and service really does work. It could be someone looking for their first AA meeting or an out of town visitor looking for a meeting after a family or business event. It could be an AA member looking to check out a new meeting or to check the time and place of a speaking commitment they signed up for. It could be someone close to the person with the alcoholic problem, looking for a simple explanation, understanding and some guidance on how best to help their loved one and maybe

even help themselves. And then there is the man or woman who may be at or near that jumping off place, ready to ask for help and willing to take a return call from one of our local 12th Step contacts. It is at these times that AA is at its best. We are most useful when we are able to use our individual experience, strength and hope to gain the trust of the suffering alcoholic and connect him or her to a local AA community where the fellowship and program can work its healing and transforming power. The principle and purpose on which Nightwatch began and continues, is to be there when someone calls looking for help when the Intergroup office is closed. Our Nightwatch groups and volunteers make that possible 7 days a week, 52 weeks a year. We are grateful to the groups that have made Nightwatch an annual group service commitment and the many AA members, both long time and first time volunteers, who step up to answer the call each and every day. Nightwatch is not an easy or convenient commitment. But there is a wealth of experience and support behind each and every shift; from the Intergroup office, through the local Nightwatch coordinator and group leaders, to each volunteer and 12th Step contact. Together we have pointed countless numbers of AA's to their first or next meeting, provided empathy and resource information to concerned family and friends, and endured obnoxious and obscene callers at all hours of the day and night. Through it all we continue to learn the extent, as well as the limits, of our human ability to be of service to the suffering alcoholic, and the truth of the saying that we only carry the message, so that

God can deliver it. Intergroup and the Nightwatch committee say thank you again for your faithful and continuing support. If your group is interested in a Nightwatch commitment, contact the Intergroup office at Intergroup@nnjaa.org or the Nightwatch committee chairman at Nightwatch@nnjaa.org. We are especially in need of groups from Hudson, Morris, Middlesex, Somerset and Union Counties to cover weeks through 2017 and into 2018. Talk about Nightwatch at your next group conscience or business meeting. If your group doesn't have enough volunteers to cover a week (11 shifts), think about joining up with another local group to cover the full commitment. Also encourage group members who are willing and able

to volunteer and serve as local

12th Step contacts. Our experience and that of most Nightwatch groups and volunteers over the years is that it is worth the time and effort, and has a positive and enduring benefit both individually and collectively.

Without all of you, we can't. For me, it has come down to "I can't, we can". If you haven't attended our convention, I would strongly suggest you do, with a visit, sitting and listening, and hopefully to stay a while. TAKING THE FIRST STEP

I am an alcoholic. I never understood what that meant until I joined the fellowship of AA. I never understood a lot of things until I joined AA. I started drinking in college when I was eighteen and kept at it steadily until April 26, 2011 when I crawled into my first meeting at the age of 58. My life, up until that night, was the story of "I". They say the heart of a sentence is the verb but I suspect it's really the subject, the "I" demanding all the attention it can claim, "I want, I need." And by the end of my drinking it really was just me and, of course, a bottle. When I finally collapsed in a bar (where else?), bleeding from a gash in my forehead after hitting the floor, I was completely alone. There was no one around to shovel me onto the stretcher except the ambulance drivers or so I was told later by an overworked cop at the scene. I was unconscious at the time. Everyone else in my life, it seemed, had had enough. And then AA happened. Of course, in the early days, I felt at once put upon, arrogant, angry and scared. I was even convinced that I could lick this minor dilemma by myself. How wrong I was involved the gradual shift from "I" to "We." In AA I learned I was not the smartest person in the room. I learned about patience, understanding and kindness all of which were shown to me even when I was at my most obnoxious and, seemingly irredeemable. Eventually I got a sponsor, a home group, and began the AA 12 Steps. And things did get better but something was always nagging at me. I stayed clean but the urge for a drink clung to me. I couldn't shake it. It was maddening. My sponsor suggested I revisit the Steps but that made me feel put upon, arrogant, angry and scared. And then something happened. About a year into the program I was at a meeting on a cold January night. I didn't want to be there. I was getting tired of the routine and felt myself slipping backwards. Across the table from me, two young men sat like mirror images of myself back when I was active. They had to be at this meeting as part of a rehab program to which they had been sentenced. It was clear they would rather be somewhere else. They looked put upon, arrogant, angry and scared. As the meeting opened and members were reading the AA Preamble, the Steps, and Traditions, I was given the page entitled "How

I don't know what came over me but I read that brief summary to those two young men as if they were the only ones in the room. Midway through I paused, pointed at them, and said, "If you have decided you want what we have and are willing to go to any length to get it – then you are ready to take certain steps." I had read or heard those words nearly a thousand times since my first meeting. The funny thing was this time I meant it. When I said, "If you want what "WE" have," I finally understood what this was all about. "WE admitted WE were powerless over alcohol." I thought to myself, "My God, I'm really in this thing. And I can't do this without these other guys." After the meeting, my sponsor asked me how I was getting on. "Great," I said. "I just finished taking my first step." Martin F.

"What does 'we' mean in your recovery? Discuss your views on unity."

I wouldn't have believed anything AA has to offer if it didn't come from another drunk who knew suffering like I knew suffering. My typical alcoholic defiance, posturing, self-pity, and bravado reliably formed barriers between my hurting self and the message from non-alcoholics (often professionals) who surely had information that I could have used. If the help wasn't delivered by a drunk who had stories I could relate to, I wasn't interested in hearing it – at least in the beginning of my recovery.

Part of the magic of AA is that each member is a living, breathing testimony of what should be impossible for an alcoholic: a daily reprieve from picking up a drink and the misery that accompanies our malady. I belonged to the segment of AA's who, instead of denying their alcoholism, adopted the belief that we were too sick for AA. Beyond help. But when I was desperate enough to sit in meetings, none of my explaining could argue with the fact of my sitting in a room with some certified hopeless cases who weren't hopeless anymore.

I didn't have any reference point or framework to understand spiritual principles when I came in, so I had to hold on to the collective experience. Coming from a place of deep distrust of myself and the world, my survival now depended on trusting the experience of these once-hopeless cases. When

I did start to understand spiritual principles, I saw how humility, for example, was at work in keeping me sober through the service of other AA's. The humility of people with time in sobriety to listen to my pain and say "me, too" and "there's a solution" saved my life. The very fact of knowing that I wasn't alone made the fight more bearable.

As I progress in sobriety, I value having a diverse network. Recognizing earlier versions of myself in newcomers is a great motivator for practicing First Things First, no matter what. On the other end, being able to run my brilliant ideas by people whose long-term sobriety I respect has saved me from disastrous consequences more times than I can count. These days, with my life practically bursting with fulfillment (still much to my own surprise), my most successful efforts result from trying a suggestion someone shared at a meeting.

Service has always been a cornerstone of my sobriety, and I see the wisdom in the suggestion to stay in the middle of AA. Without unity there's no middle to stray from; no chance for my survival, let alone my successes. My gratitude for the program, and the gift of my anonymous place in it, doesn't come from the naturally defiant alcoholic state I started with. That miracle was passed on to

me through the shared experience of fellow sufferers, and I couldn't have met my higher power, my true self, or a meaningful existence without it.
